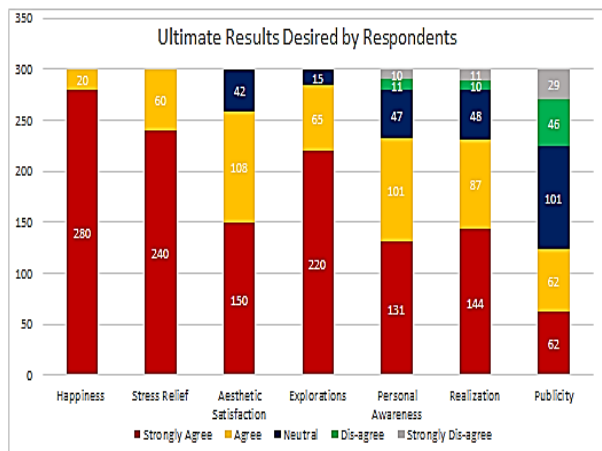


Fig. 1: Ultimate Results Desired by Respondents.

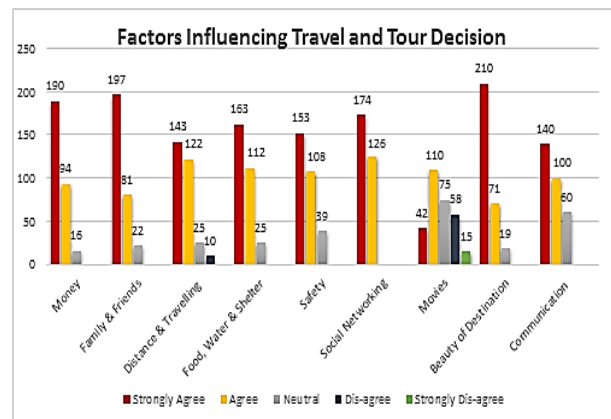


Fig. 2: Factors Influencing Respondents Decisions.

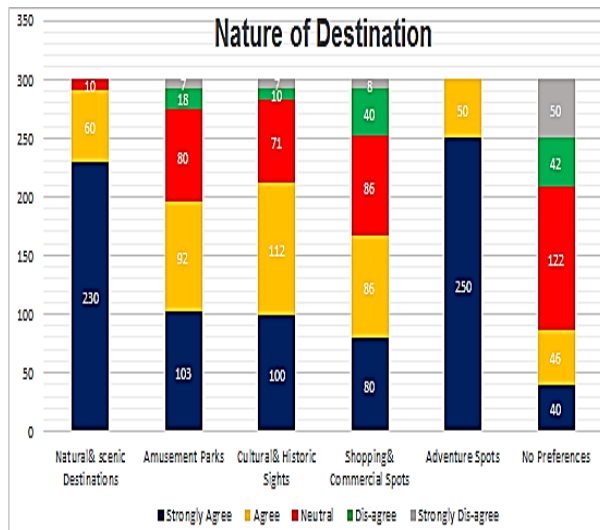


Fig. 3: Nature of Destination as Preferred by Respondents.
